Pattern


- This pattern is worked in joined rounds. No stitch markers are used or required.
- At the beginning of each line, you will find "Row + a number" to indicate which row you are starting. For example, if a row is repeated, you will read "Rows 10-16". This indicates repeating that row 7 times.
- When parts of the instructions repeat throughout the row, that part is placed between (), followed by the number of times it is to be repeated.
- The number in [] at the end of the row indicates the number of stitches you should have after you finish crocheting the row.

Techniques

Magic Ring:

Single crochet, followed by a number, in magic ring, most frequently 4, 6 or 7, indicates how many stitches you need to make in the ring.

The example, **picture 1**, shows 6 stitches in the magic ring.



Starting a new row:

After the slip stitch (slst) made in the previous row, chain 1 and turn your work. The first stitch should be where the arrow is pointing. (*Picture 2*)



Slip stitch at the end of the row:

Since the pieces are worked in joined rounds, when you finish crocheting the row, you must join the end of the row to the beginning of the row.


- 1. Insert the hook in the chain 1 made at the beginning of the row before turning your work.

 This stitch will be at a different angle than the first stitch made. (pictures 3 and 4)
- 2. Yarn over and pull through the stitch and through the loop on your hook. (pictures 5 and 6)

Tips: Do <u>not</u> pull tightly on the slip stitch. This will prevent having a visible seam. The only time you should pull it tightly is when you join your magic circle.










Invisible decrease (inv dec) versus decrease (dec):

Invisible decrease: "I use the invisible decrease for pieces worked in joined rounds."

Steps when working a row from the outside of the piece:


- 1. Insert the hook into the FRONT loops only of the next 2 stitches. There will be 3 loops on your hook (picture 7)
- 2. Yarn over and pull your hook through the same 2 front loops. You will have 2 loops on your hook. (picture 8)
- 3. Yarn over again and pull through the 2 loops. You will be left with 1 loop on your hook. (pictures 9 and 10)



Steps when working a row from the inside of the piece:

1. Insert the hook into the BACK loops only of the next 2 stitches. This will make your decrease invisible on the outside of the piece. (picture 11)

The next steps are the same as previously described for FRONT loops.




Decrease: "I use decrease (dec) for pieces worked flat. Both sides of the piece will be visible. There is no outside or inside."

- 1. Insert the hook in the next stitch, under both loops. (picture 12)
- 2. Yarn over and pull. You will have 2 loops on your hook. (picture 13)
- 3. Insert the hook in the next stitch, again under both loops. (picture 14)
- 4. Yarn over and pull. You will have 3 loops on your hook. (picture 15)
- 5. Yarn over again and pull through the 3 loops. You will be left with 1 loop on your hook. (picture 16)
